ne important issue in politics and life for college students is the ever rising costs of post-secondary education. It's an issue that affects many of us personally, but also one that affects the lives of those who aren't in college because of the high costs.

Those who can't afford to go to college or technical-vocational school will have a harder time getting a well paying job. This is hard on society and can create a hard cycle to break when the children of the same people won't be able to afford a great education as well.

With costs so high something must be done. One solution that has been considered is universal post-secondary education, which is post-secondary education available to all people equally, funded through taxes, and run by the government.

Now, I have no opposition to universal post-secondary education on principle. I'd love to graduate without being tens of thousands of dollars in debt. Education is extremely important to everyone in society, not only for finding a job but for living a life in which one has

The problem is that making post-secondary education "free" isn't enough if we treat secondary education the way we currently do. If the the way to get out of poverty is by attending a standard post-secondary school like Gustavus, then the labor market for people with college degrees will over-saturate

We can afford to send everyone to a state university or liberal arts college through taxes, but this won't actually make things better. Instead, what will happen is that the market for jobs, which is already competitive for those with college degrees, will become even more competitive. Having a degree doesn't guarantee getting a job, ask any recent graduate. You need internships, leadership positions, and extra things in addition to your degree to set you apart.

An influx of people in universities won't lift the poor out

An influx of people in universities won't lift the poor out of poverty. Some may end up in fields with better job markets such as engineering, but the competitiveness of those fields of study within college aren't likely to lift masses of people into a better life either.

Universal post-secondary education won't work if we continue to think of education in this way. What needs to happen to make universal-post secondary education possible is a shift in focus away from college preparation in secondary education, towards life preparation. The emphasis on post-second-

ary education needs to not be primarily centered around colleges and universities, instead to technical-vocational schooling.

So if we can send everyone to college though taxes, why wouldn't we?

If this happens there will be an increase in the number of people attending college, but even more importantly there will be more people going to school to learn to how to be an electrician, plumber, mechanic, and other technical careers.

Jobs like these are in high demand, pay well, and can lift people out of poverty. So why don't people go to technical school or get more training for jobs like these?

A large part of the reason is that this work is frowned upon or considered "lesser" work by many Americans.

Many will say they have great respect for people with the technical-know-how to wire a house or install piping. Yet, few of the same people would consider the same kind of work for themselves or their children. Universal post-secondary

Universal post-secondary education won't work in the United States unless we start teaching differently at all levels of education. Perhaps, even then, universal post-secondary education isn't the answer. Does education need to be privatized? But that's a thought for another day.

immediately, it just makes it so much easier, at least for me to tackle it.



The men kicked off the season by winning their home tournament, the Gustavus Classic, last weekend. The Gusties beat St. Norbert College, a top 20 team of DIII soccer in the nation, with a score of 2-0 and continued by steamrolling Viterbo University to win 3-0.

With a 2-0 record for the weekend, and a 3-0 record overall, Coach Mike Middleton has nothing but praise for the team's performance.

"The tournament went extremely well, with two good results and the lads performing at a high level throughout. I was

really pleased with the level of play, our style of play, and how the lads went about their tasks," Middleton said.

The level of play for Gustavus is evident if one takes a deeper look into the game stats against Viterbo. The shot difference was 26-4 in favor of Gustavus, with a total of zero shots on target for the opposition. The difference in shots taken speaks to the team's strategy of keeping a high ball possession, which Senior Center Mid Charlie Adams noticed.

It's tough because we were smaller sized players, but we are very technical players and we are good on the ball. We try to pick teams apart," Adams said.

All of this success and skillful play did not come without effort, however.

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Football gets off to a flying start


¬he Gustavus Football team traveled to St. Bonifacius to take on Crow n College in a non-conference game on Saturday night. The Gusties got out of the grid in incredible fashion, scoring four touch-downs within the first quarter and winning the game 56-13. Leading the eccentric offense was Senior Wide Receiver Matt Boyce, who caught a 77-yard delivery from fellow Senior Mitch Hendricks with a few minutes to go of the first quarter.

"We came out with a lot of en-

ergy and were prepared for the warm weather. I think that our preparation on them was great. We knew what we were going to see and how to adjust to it. We made some big plays and some younger guys stepped up," Boyce said.

One of those younger guys is Sophomore Running Back Leeland Lauti who, a few minutes before Boyce clasped the projectile from Hendricks, introduced the scoring with an 11-play touchdown.

"Offensively, I felt like all around we did a heck of a job.

From the passing game, to the run game, Crown had a tough time stopping us. That all starts with the offensive line. Without

Although he is one of the younger players on the team, Lauti doesn't fail to recognize what needs to improve for the team to make an impact in the

"I feel like consistency goes with staying alive throughout the whole game, we came out firing the first half with vengeance. Yet, we let up coming back out for the second half. If we can play like we did the first half, the whole game, to me we will reach our goal as MIAC champs," Lauti continued.

Despite the impressive opening, Head Coach Peter Haugen - entering his seventh year as the main conductor of the Gusties - remains with both feet on the ground as he recognizes the importance of everyday progress even when skies are looking blue.

"We are excited," Haugen said. "We have been ranked fifth in the preseason poll and our goal is the make the moves up. Most of our energy is going towards daily improvement, not necessarily being preoccupied with a record. As we have some freshmen and sophomores contributing, it will be a process for them to get a complete grasp of our offense and defense in just a couple of weeks," Haugen

Another player leading the line against Crown was Mitch Hendricks. Although the record breaking quarterback threw 385 yards completing 25 out of 32 passes, he still feels like there is space for improvement in his

to try to get everyone together. Coach Haugen also does a great job of getting everyone on the same page in terms of goals and visions. He brings it up at every meeting so there is no risk we will forget it," Hendricks said.
