





# Men's Golf season comes to a close

## Underclassmen show promise for future seasons

The Gustavus Men's Golf team's season concluded two weekends ago at the Bobby Krig Invite, where the Gusties took fifth out of an eight team field.

With the season spanning across both the fall and the spring, the Gusties have done their fair share of golfing this year, even with the inclement

Minnesota spring weather experienced earlier this year.

"Weather was awful this spring, or late winter you can call it. Thankfully, we have our Drenttel Golf Facility to use, but it is really hard to travel to play, then come back inside for practice, and travel again for another tournament," Head Coach Scott Moe said. "We made the most of the situation, finishing our year with a win over the top ranked team in the

country."

That big win was over St. Thomas, who was ranked number one in the country at the time of the Gustie Spring Invite, which was held at the Le Sueur Country Club, the Gusties' home course.

Despite this strong performance, the Gusties, unfortunately, did not make the post-season.

"If you win the MIAC, you get an automatic bid. If not, you try for an at large bid, which we did not receive this year. We struggled some in the fall, which made it tougher this spring to try and put ourselves in contention to get an at large bid for nationals. However, our work ethic over the winter and early spring was awesome, and our players were better prepared and performed better than we did last fall, even with limited playing and practice opportunities," Coach Moe said.

Being that the season spans over the fall and spring, performance in the beginning portion of the season matters a lot.

"The fall season is an important season for golf. If you play well in the fall and at the conference tournament, which is also in the fall, then you put your team in a good position

to make it to nationals, which is decided in the spring. Essentially how well you do in the fall will have a strong influence on the decision of who goes to nationals," Junior Jordan Miller said.

During the fall portion of the season, the Gusties had a very strong showing from one of their standout senior golfers at the conference meet.

Senior Alec Aunan took home first place at the competitive tournament.

"Alec Aunan probably had the most consistent season for us, capping that off with his lone win, but a very important one, the MIAC title in the fall," Moe said.

Aunan golfed alongside one other senior this season, Chris Captain.

"It was an emotional season with the amount of memories made with the guys, coaches, and all of my family members who have supported my golf career over the past 14 years. The next chapter of my life will include golf, but men's league and playing a couple times a month will be a major change from competing and training every day to become better," Captain said.

"I'm really looking forward to our banquet on Sunday, as

we get to thank Captain and Aunan for their amazing contributions to the team and the college over their four years, and setting the tone for the returning players," Moe said.

As for the returning golfers, there will be one senior on the team next year, Miller, who is really looking forward to next season.

"Our season went well, but not as well as we'd like. I'm definitely looking forward to next season. We have some good freshman and sophomore talent and hopefully some good incoming recruits. After a disappointing finish to the year, I think everyone is definitely looking forward to summer to get out and improve our games so we can come back next year and really perform well from the start," Miller said.

Despite the team being a somewhat younger squad, Moe said he believes in his golfers going into next season.

"We have a great group of players coming back next fall and a couple of very talented incoming freshman that will help out from day one," Moe said.

The Gusties will hope for development, success, and nice weather all year long in the upcoming season.

# Baseball's postseason run concludes

The Gustavus Men's Baseball Team continued their historic season this past week as they competed in MIAC postseason play for the first time in a decade.

After a rocky stretch of games in April, the Gusties turned their season around with three straight sweeps of conference opponents to give themselves a look at making the playoffs.

Their hopes came down to the last game of the year, at conference rival St. Thomas, and the Gusties came through with a huge performance in a 6-1 win.

With that, they were off to CHS Field, home of the St. Paul Saints, for the opening round of the MIAC playoffs.

As the No. 6 seed, the Gusties were set to face the No. 3 seed, the St. Mary's Cardinals.

Despite being the underdog, the Gusties came into the game confident on the tenth anniversary of their last playoff appearance and were able to get on the board first.

In the top of the third inning, with two outs and the bases loaded, First Year phenom Cole Pengilly sent a line drive single through the middle of the field that scored two runs.

In his next at bat, Pengilly singled to left field and fellow First Year Carter Clemensen

scored from second base to give the Gusties a 3-0 lead.

The Cardinals responded in the bottom half of the same inning and added two runs of their own, but it proved to be too little.

The Gusties added to their lead in the seventh inning with two more runs.

The first came off the bat of Pengilly once again, while the second came as Senior Brock Peterson singled to center and scored Junior Ryan Moriarty.

The Gusties rode this 5-2 lead to the end of the game and secured their first playoff victory in 10 years.

Junior Adam Stockwell got the start for Gustavus and was rock-solid on the mound.

He went six and two-thirds while giving up just one earned run on five hits.

Senior Casey Lewandowski came in as a reliever in the sixth inning with the bases loaded and got the Gusties out of the inning.

He didn't give up any runs, and earned the save.

With the win, the Gusties moved on to the double-elimination portion of the Playoffs to face top-seeded St. John's.

Unfortunately, the Johnnies caught fire early and notched four runs in the first inning and two more in the second.

The Gusties were able to respond in the fourth inning and cut their lead to 6-3, but the Johnnies ultimately held on for the win.

Archer batted in two of the runs with a single and Ethan Mocchi knocked the final run in with a sac fly.

The Gusties hopes remained alive however, as the double-elimination format allowed them to keep playing and set up a rematch with the Tommies.

In the top of the first inning, the Gustie offense produced three runs to give them the early lead. Senior Nolan Lepel batted in two runs with a double to left field, and scored off of an RBI single from Senior Brock Peterson.

The Tommies responded with two runs of their own in the second inning to make the score 3-2 in the Gusties' favor. The score wouldn't change until the seventh inning.

In the top of the seventh, RBI singles from Pengilly and Archer extended the Gusties lead to 5-2 and put them in a great position to upset the Tommies.

However, the Tommies scored three runs off three hits in the eighth inning to tie the game.

Despite some pressure from the Tommies in the bottom of the ninth, First Year Ben Brauer was able to get the Gusties out of the jam and send the game to extra innings.

The Gusties weren't able to score in the top of the 10th, and a walk-off homerun for the Tommies ended the Gusties outstanding season.

"CHS was a blast to play at. The field was beautiful and there was a solid group of fans that went up to support us also. Hopefully playoffs are there again next year, and hopefully we can play a few more games there next year," Junior Matt Berkner said.

For their efforts throughout the season, five Gusties were named to the MIAC All-Conference Team. Seniors Casey Lewandowski and Nolan Lepel, Juniors Sam Archer and

Ryan Moriarty, and First Year Carter Clemensen were among those honored.

"This means a lot for the program and the direction it's moving in. I think that we're capable of making this a standard every year with the guys we have coming back," Berkner said.

The Gusties will miss a strong group of seniors, but their productive crop of newcomers hint at a bright future for the Gusties.

# Gusties compete at MSU Twilight Meet

## Track and Field boasts many personal records

The Gusties headed to Mankato on May 4th to compete in the Minnesota State University Twilight meet where both the women's and men's teams registered strong performances.

Multiple members of the women's team registered personal bests and top performances around the board. Junior MaKayla Stowell led the Gustavus sprinters as she recorded personal bests in both the 100 and 200-meter dashes while also finishing second in both events.

Sophomore Katie Keelin also set a personal record of her own in the hammer throw, beating her original best by a distance of three feet and eight inches while finishing first. Junior Bailey Van Den Heuvel also has a personal best in the throw with a distance of 151-11, good for fourth place.

"Today was a good meet for us all the way around. The throwers stepped up and hit some big PR's. We saw lots of good performances and that is what we're looking for heading into conference." Head Coach Dale Bahr said.

On the track, the duo of Sophomore Tierney Winter

and Senior Lydia Hayes finished second and third in the 1,500-meter run, respectively.

On the men's side, Junior Michael Hensch and Freshmen Taylor Rooney continued their dominant seasons, with both registering top finishes in their events.

Hensch led the Gustie throwers where he finished first in the javelin while placing second in both the hammer throw and shot put. His throw of 189 in the hammer throw set a new personal record for Hensch, originally broken the week prior at the Drake Alternative.

"We had some distance guys do some pacing and I think we were a little tired, but we definitely had some strong individual performances today," Head Coach Dale Bahr said.

Rooney finished first in the 110-meter hurdles and also set a personal best in the event with a time of 14.63. Freshmen Jeremy Gilbertson finished first in the 1,500-meter run with a time of 4:17.71.

"We are looking forward to next week. It has kind of been a tough season and it's fun to get some good weather and now we will see how will stack up against the rest of the conference next week," Bahr said.

The Gusties would then move onto the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Outdoor Championships last Friday where the men finished seventh while the women fin-

ished sixth.

In day one, the women earned 25 points and finished the day in sixth place out of eleven total teams.

Both Keelin and Van Den Heuvel earned points in the hammer throw where they placed third and fourth while Freshmen Bella Klabough earned three points from her sixth place finish in the discus.

Sophomore Alex Anderson added added six points to the Gustie total with a third place finish in the high jump. Additionally, the 4x800-meter relay team, consisting of Senior Lydia Hayes, Sophomore Haley Anderson and Freshmen Josie Blake and Kourtney Kulseth finished fourth and added five points.

"We're in a really good position having lots of people available to score points tomorrow in the finals. Definite shout out to the 4x800 relay team, all four of those ladies did not have a chance to score in an individual event but they got together and embraced their opportunity," said Coach Bahr.

On day two, the women finished up their events with a score of 75, good for sixth place overall.

Stowell and Senior Marisa Morgan both registered eight points with their second place finishes. Morgan threw a personal best 131-9 in the javelin and Stowell ran a 12.28 in the 100-meter dash while also add-

ing a point in the 200-meter dash.

Also adding points to the Gustie total were Winter in the 1,500, Senior Sadie Klug in the 5,000-meter and Senior Olivia Rosenow in the 3,000-meter steeplechase. Junior Abbie Schnabel also added five points with a fourth place finish in the 800-meter run.

The men's team mirrored the women in the standings, also finishing in sixth and tallied 23 points.

"We had some good races and performances and should be able to score some more points tomorrow in the throws," said Bahr.

Of the 23 points, Hensch scores 18 of them, winning the javelin throw with a distance of 192-1 and also placing second in the shot put at 52-5.25. Additionally, Freshmen Andrew Stumbo finished fifth in the 10,000 meter run and earned the Gusties four points.

Day two for the men saw them drop a spot in the standings, finishing seventh overall with a final total of 63 points.

"We got more points than we were predicted to get to it was good to see," Coach Bahr said.

Rooney won the 110-meter hurdles with a time of 14.69 while also finishing second in the high jump at 6 foot 5 inches.

Hensch headlined the Gustie throwers, finishing second in discus and third in hammer throw for a total of 14 points.
