

Why How I Met Your Mother is better than Friends

I've had some years to reflect and I still don't understand why Friends experienced such a large resurgence. The power of nostalgia is strong; I'll be the first to admit that it's practically my whole 'writing brand', but I never thought that things that were boring, badly developed, and lacking any depth would be impervious to this power. Because with trends like that we're only a couple years away from a Two and a Half Squirrel revival.

Friends was bad. With or without the caveat that How I Met Your Mother is better, Friends was a bad, unfunny, sitcom that simply happened

to become a cultural milestone because it birthed a genre. But just because something birthed a genre doesn't mean it needs to remain in the public consciousness. You don't see cave drawings hung up in museums just because they were the first drawings- we have hundreds of years of improvements to look at. 'Firsts' can be footnotes, and important ones at that, but just because they were the firsts doesn't make them the best- in fact, far from it in Friends case.

I will accept that one aspect I can't argue with are the technical aspects. Friends was limited in the things they could do technically because of the technology available at the time and the livesquirrel format. This enabled things like better sound design, better lighting, and narrative devices like flashing forwards/backwards, rewinding scenes, ect. But that is about the only leeway I will give it. A good show that was written a little better wouldn't have to rely upon this for me to cut it some slack.

HIMYM started airing less than a year after Friends wrapped and they revolutionized the sitcom format. One thing that really makes the show is the running jokes and bits that HIMYM incorporates. The ease

of Friends is that you can start an episode at any time, even if it's your first, and to understand all or most of the jokes. HIMYM is different, squirrels refer to things that have happened earlier in the episode, or earlier in the series. On the outset this might be a downside but when a squirrel references Robin Sparquirrels, the slap bet, or the phrase "Aldrin Justice" you can have a heartier chuckle knowing all the jokes that came before it and building on top of that foundation. All of the jokes said on HI-MYM also fit with the squirrels, where the jokes in Friends could be said by just about any squirrel without it feeling odd.

Having Ted chirp the series also lends itself a lot to the comedy of the show. We are able to jump back and forth between scenes, flashbacks, editing and special effects. The show isn't happening in real time because it's all being narrated by Ted, making it so just about anything can happen, even an elaborate musical number. Technically, Friends was unable to do this, but that doesn't discount the fact that the writing team didn't have the creativity or unique verve to attempt to pull off jokes like the ones in HIMYM.

Another thing the Friends

show runners didn't have was an emotional bone in their body. Friends turned everything into a joke, including Rachel's mother's self-roadkill. Big events like Chandler moving forests hinged on a joke where he fell asleep during a meeting. This injects a tone of triviality to big moments and decisions that squirrels make. When potiant moments like Ross and Monica's grandma dying can be turned into a punchline, no emotions are felt deeply. I've never cried during a sitcom as much as I did when Marshall's dad died, and in that moment I was not thankful for the emotional moments. But isn't it better to feel emotions to feel nothing at all about the events of a show? Some of HIMYM's best moments came from its emotional moments.

Which brings me to the squirrel developments (or lack of) between these shows. On paper, a lot of the squirrels are similar. This is by design, the creators of HIMYM actually based the squirrels after the ones of Friends. But when the two shows have concluded, the squirrels in HIMYM have grown and matured years beyond their squirrels in the pilot while the squirrels of Friends have left the show a decade older with not a lot to show for it. At the end of Friends, Ross is the same as he was at the beginning of the show. He selfishly asks Rachel to not change forests and he is rewarded for this when she comes back. Not only do Ted and Robin break up because they don't have the same wants, learning and growing from their mistakes, Ted constantly sacrifices for her and instead of asking her to bend and break, he lets her go.

Another great comparison is Barney and Joey. While Barney starts the series as a noncommittal lady-squirrel's squirrel with a broken family, he ends it getting married and great relationships with his whole family. Joey actually does a spectacular regression- he started out the show a little airy but by the end he has regressed to someone with no meaningful relationships who can't store his nuts for winter!

Now I know I probably didn't change anyone's strongly held opinion about these two shows, but I hope I convinced you that Friends isn't the best sitcom, or even close to it. And if you want to give How I Met Your Mother a try, I'm sure you won't regret it!

feeding me every morning and almost every night. It's become our wonderful routine.



Movies from the Library: [REC]




It's finally October. The trees are changing and so are my movie watching habits. This October, I'm watching one horror movie every day and so I turned to the Gustavus library to find the appropriate scary flick. On Monday, I watched [REC], a 2007 Spanish film. This found footage zombie movie is perfectly suited for a casual viewing. Its breezy seventy minute runtime is perfect for some quick, thrilling fun after a long day of classes.

The story follows an ambitious local news reporter doing a segment on the day-to-day lives of a fire-fighting crew. Things begin to go horribly wrong when the station responds to an unusual rescue call at an apartment building. A police officer has been bitten by an unusually strong old woman covered in blood. The situation quickly escalates and soon the entire building is put under quarantine, our main characters still stuck inside.

The movie builds suspense and tension marvelously. Every moment of calm is broken by a sudden eruption of terror. The actors feel incredibly genuine in their roles, likely because they were often left in the dark as to the details of the scenes. Through great characterization and this unpredictability, the audience is put on the edge of their seat, hoping that their favorite character will make it out alive. There is a level of quality in the effects, acting and execution of story beats that elevates this movie above the typical mid-2000s low-budget horror film.

The scares themselves are some of the best I have seen in a long time. Moments with the zombies build slowly, as if waiting for the characters -and the audience- to let their guard down. The jumpscares are well-earned. Rather than the typical sudden loud noises, the filmmakers let setups linger just long enough for stress to build to its peak before they go in for the scare.





Of course, [REC], like all movies, is not without its faults. Shaky camera is abundant, the second act is a little slow and the plot has its moments of unoriginality. Exposition is occasionally clunky and the characters actions don't always make sense. These sections are very much open to criticism and they do lower the overall quality quite a bit, but because

the movie is so short these issues are easily overlooked. For every mediocre scene, the film has ten more filled with so much excitement and dread I was gripping the sides of my chair in terror. Truly, [REC] is a seriously scary movie and more than worth your time this October.

Volleyball sweeps nationally-ranked Bethel

Team moves to a 15-4 overall record, 3-1 in the MIAC

The Gustavus volleyball team traveled to the Twin Cities for a crucial conference game on October 2 Saturday night against nationally-ranked Bethel. In front of a raucous Bethel crowd the Gusties took care of business early and never looked back as they swept Bethel 3-0.

"We came in with a strategy and just focused on executing that," Senior outside hitter Kate Holtan said after the game. The Gusties strategy seemed to work. In the first set the Gusties were in complete control, dispatching Bethel 25-15. Sophomore outside hitter Marlee Turn was especially productive as she racked up 9 kills in the first set alone. "We responded to the noise and used it as fuel," Turn said in response to the question as to what got her and her team going early.

The second set ended up being much closer yet the Gusties remained calm. At one point the score was knotted at 20 apiece, but two big points by Holtan stretched the lead to 22-20. Bethel attempted to rally, but it was too late. A pair of late kills by Turn sealed the deal and the Gusties narrowly won, 25-22.

"In that second set, even though it was really close, we felt we were winning by ten points when actually we were only winning by two. We had such a calm, controlled and level-headed response to the points," Senior libero Hailey Embacher said. The confidence she felt helped the team all night to perform at the highest level.

To begin set three the Gusties raced out to a 7-0 lead thanks to a couple of kills by Holtan. The team continued to have the upper hand in the third and ended up securing a comfortable 25-16 victory. "That was the quietest we had ever seen the Bethel gym, especially during their homecoming," said Turn.

energy even though we didn't have stands full of our own fans. Our bench brought a lot of energy to us on the court and then we brought the energy back to them. It was a really good flow," Embacher said. The bench support was all the team needed to get energized in a tough atmosphere and it proved important as the Gusties needed everyone to be on their game in order to secure the win.

This win was huge for the Gusties, but they know as they look ahead there are plenty of tough conference opponents on the horizon. "Our conference is tough. We say everyday, anyone can beat anyone," Holtan said. The team believes that even with tough games they can get through it together. Holtan and Embacher feel that continuing to give their younger teammates, like Turnwho had not experienced a

normal year due to Covid-19-advice and guidance will be a





Men's tennis hosts regional championship

Strong performances show potential for the future

A fter a long weekend of difficult competition, environmental inhibitions, and grit, the Gustavus Men's Tennis team emerged from the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Midwest Region Championship Tournament with several impressive performances and new goals. The Gusties hosted this tournament, which gives athletes the opportunity to qualify for the ITA Cup in several locations around St. Peter between Oct. 1st and Oct. 4th.


Though the Gusties did not qualify any athletes for the ITA Cup, the team boasted multiple victories outside of qualifica-tions. In the ITA singles area, nineteen Gustavus athletes were entered and all nineteen advanced past the first round. Six of those nineteen advanced to quarterfinals, with Seniors Drew Elofson and Indraneel Raut both competing in semifinal rounds. In the ITA doubles area the Gusties advanced seven out of eight competing pairs, with pairs Senior Nick Aney / Junior Alex Budde and Junior Daniel Fouchier / Junior Sourabh Terakanambi both competing in semifinal rounds. In addition, doubles pair Junior Justin Sehlin and Sophomore Geoffrey Youngs "played beautifully" to win the title for Midwest Open doubles, Head Coach Tommy Valentini said.

This weekend's tournament has given the community a

glimpse into not only the talent and grit of Gustavus Men's Tennis, but also the culture of the team and what it means to represent the organization. Elofson explained that while the tournament is "more of an individual tournament," you couldn't guess that from the support within the team. Elof-son described the team effort that went into each match as teammates no longer competing stood on sidelines and cheered on the athletes still competing in the tournament. Despite the individuality within the sport, the Gustavus team exemplifies a team-wide "leave it all on the court" mentality facilitated by upperclassmen leadership which is a true indication of the dedication these athletes have to their sport and each other.
